Life's A Hoot!!

With 225 different species of owls worldwide including 19 species in the U.S., we have generally five species in Cass County. Thankfully owls may not be shot, captured, transported or owned without a permit. To discover more about their unique world, google owls at Minnesota Department of National Resources.



Wise Owls of Northern Minnesota



Great Horned Owl. Nicknamed the tiger with wings, the great horned owl is a fearless bird of prey. It will kill a skunk and may eat more than 4,000 mice a year. With a wingspan of more than 4-feet and weighing 3-5 pounds, they are unique in having long eyelashes. They do not migrate and can be found in remote wilderness areas as well as in cities.



Barred Owl. A Barred Owl's right ear is higher than its left ear. Hearing from two different angles helps it pinpoint the location of prey they hunt including mice, squirrels, rabbits, birds, frogs, fish and crayfish. A grayish-brown bird, it weighs 1-2 pounds and is 17-20 inches tall.



Northern Saw-whet Owl. The smallest owl weighing only about 4-ounces with a length of 7-8 inches lives in evergreen forests and is named for one of its calls that sounds like a saw being whetted. With white belly stripes and no ear tufts, some migrate but many stay in Minnesota each winter.



Long-Eared Owl. A medium-size bird weighing about 10-ounces with a wingspan of 3-feet and 12-15 inches tall, this owl's mottled-brown coloring blends into tree bark. The protrusions on its head aren't really ears, but rather feathers. It is known for a variety of hoots, shrieks, whistles and alarm calls.



Snowy Owl. Harry Potter's owl Hedwig is a female Snowy Owl. Living in the arctic tundra of Canada and Alaska and weighing up to 5-pounds, this large white raptor comes to northern Minnesota during some winters to hunt voles and other small animals.


4th July Boat Parade by Cindy Larson



Help celebrate Independence Day by joining in the 4th of July Boat Parade around Blackwater Lake. Boats should gather near the entrance to Little Blackwater Lake between 1:45 and 2:00 pm on July 4. The Larsons and the Skalickys will start leading the parade at 2:00 pm going clockwise around the lake. This year the Board has decided that passing of numbers and ballots between boats is not safe with regard to COVID-19, and so unfortunately this year there will be no voting or prizes. This does not mean, however, that you should show your patriotism or creativity any less!!

We hope you are healthy and are able to join us either in the parade or waving from your shoreline.

Blackwater Lake is one of about 520 lakes in Cass County that are 10 acres or larger. It is 767 acres with 336 acres of littoral area (15 feet deep or less and the approximate area of submerged plant growth). In its deepest spot it is 67+ feet deep. With the unusual shape and bays, we have 7.6 miles of shoreline. The lake receives water from Island Lake as well as surrounding land and flows to Woman Lake under County Road 11 on the north side. (*Source: DNR Lakefinder*)



Our volunteers collect water samples and conduct searches for aquatic invasive species (AIS) to keep track of the condition of our lake. This monitoring allows us to react if we see declines in water quality or if an AIS is found. We are fortunate to have great water quality. At an average of 15 feet transparency in 2019, our lake is clearer than ½ of the lakes in the Leech Lake Watershed. Lake transparency (clarity) has gradually improved since it was first monitored in the mid-1980s. We can all do our part to keep it that way by using best management practices such as not applying fertilizers near the lake, leaving a buffer of natural vegetation on the shoreline, regularly maintaining your septic system, and using clean-drain-dry practices to prevent introduction and spread of AIS when launching or removing boats from the lake. Enjoy the lake and treat it well so we can continue to enjoy it well into the future.

Recycling Refresher

There's a good chance you're recycling wrong. But it's not necessarily your fault. There are tons of rules to follow. Because it's so complicated, people often end up falling short despite having the best intentions. To help out, here are highlights of the *Cass County Recycling Guidelines*:

Plastics

Cass County ONLY accepts bottles, jars, tubs & lids. NO PLASTIC BAGS. NO styrofoam or shrink wrap. NO food packaging or film. NO plastic cups, plates or utensils. NO automotive containers. NO pesticide containers.

Fluorescent Bulbs

Dispose at any Cass County transfer station and not in your recycling bin.

Batteries

1) Alkaline batteries should be thrown into the trash as they no longer contain mercury, 2) Lead acid from automotive, marine and some computer batteries can be taken to Cass County solid waste transfer site, and 3) Button and rechargeable batteries may have mercury or other metals and should be dropped at special boxes at a solid waste transfer station or participating pharmacy or retail stores.

E-Waste, Appliances & Tires (off-rim)

Bring computer & electronics to Pine River, Walker-Hackensack and May Township transfer sites.

Furniture

DONATE working and useable appliances or furniture.

Hazardous Waste/Paint

Take to the Pine River Transfer Station. Good used paint and other products may be stored at the transfer station and given away.

Sharps/Pharmaceuticals

Must be disposed of in household garbage, inside of puncture-resistant containers such as coffee cans, detergent bottles or containers designed for such use. These cannot be disposed of in pharmaceutical drop boxes. Special labels are available from the county public health and environmental services departments.

Unneeded Medications

Can be dropped off in "Take-it-to-the-Box" drop-off sites at the Cass County Sheriff's Office and other locations.

Motor Oil & Antifreeze

Cass County offers disposal of used motor oil, antifreeze and oil filters at all locations except Crooked Lake Township. Do NOT mix motor oil and antifreeze. Antifreeze has its own disposal container.

Membership/Treasurer Reports Linda Burns, Treasurer

Membership. Our current membership stands at 137, a little less than last year's record number 142. There are several new owners on Blackwater Lake; we distributed Welcome Packets and a few have joined our ranks. *Welcome to Blackwater Lake!* Annual membership dues remain \$30 and are due by July 1; please mail the membership form and check to the address on the form. Please consider adding a donation toward the Lake Protection Fund.

Treasury Report. Following Association of Cass County Lake's (ACCL) recommendation, we created a second bank account to document expenses and credits associated with lake protection activities, including efforts to combat AIS. I'll refer to our original checking account as our General account and to the new as the Lake Protection Fund (LPF).

The LPF account was opened with \$2,187 transferred from the General account—the balance from prior years (donations minus AIS expenses 2016–June 30, 2019). Additional income of \$2,958 from donations, silent auction, Blackwater Lake wear, and interest was added. Expenses for AIS monitoring tools and bank fees were \$87. The LPF current balance is \$5,061.

The General account beginning balance was \$5,658. Additional income of \$7,068 from dues, donations, silent auction, and Blackwater Lake wear was added. Expenses totaled \$9,548, including a \$5,145 transfer to the LPF (per above), beaver control, BLURB, seedlings, dues to affiliate organizations, and refreshments. Current balance is \$3,178. The combined total of both accounts is \$8,239.

Since July 1, members have donated \$2,010 to the AIS/Lake Protection fund, bringing the total to \$6,219 since 2016. We are very grateful for the generosity of the members who donated since last Spring's BLURB (listed below).
