Minnesota Fun Fish Facts

There are more than 27,000 living species of fish worldwide. Minnesota is home to approximately 162 species. Fish scales are laid down in rings each year—like tree rings. They can be used to determine the age of the fish. All fish are vertebrates—meaning that they have backbones and they breathe through their gills. Most fish lack eyelids—although some saltwater sharks have a blinking-like membrane that acts as an eyelid.

Did you know?

The **Walleye** was designated Minnesota's state fish in 1965. The name "Walleye" refers to it's large milky pupils. The inner part of the eye reflects light, allowing the fish to see in dark or murky water. A female Walleye produces 40,000 to 250,000 eggs per season, depending on her size and condition. Studies have shown that Walleye can live as long as 29 years.



Did you know that largemouth bass and smallmouth bass are included in the **Sunfish** Family along with bluegill, pumpkinseed and crappies? Bluegill spawning beds from 6 to 12 inches in diameter are found in shallow water—so they are perfect fish for our kids and grandkids to catch off the dock. Spawning Bluegills aggressively protect their spawning beds and will attack anything that comes near them—even a hook. This makes them easy to catch during the spring.

The **Minnow** Family has 48 species existing in the state and is Minnesota's largest fish family. Minnows aren't necessarily small, and small fish aren't necessarily minnows. Minnows are a very important link in the aquatic food chain because they're a food source for many larger fish. Carp are the largest members of the Minnow Family in Minnesota waters and are also the strongest swimmers of Minnesota's warm water species.

Did you know that Blackwater Lake is home to about 25 species of fish? How many of them can you identify?

The girls still talk about "the guy who was netting." Thank you Paul Norman!
- We enjoyed many family holiday gatherings including my folks 60th wedding anniversary in 2006. We've made many friendships with neighbors on the lake that still continue on today. Sadly, my parents have passed on. I bought "The Cabin" in 2014, and have enjoyed fostering so many memories and still finding items that make me smile.

Membership & Treasurer Report Linda Burns, Treasurer

Last year's membership was 117—down from the past two years, 138 and 142. For the current year starting July 1, our membership is 96. Forty-one (41) attended the Annual Meeting on July 17.

Treasury summary of last year, July 1, 2020—June 30, 2021 (amounts rounded to nearest dollar):

The General Fund started with \$4122 and ended with \$3020. Our expenses for the year were \$3502; the largest expenses were beaver control and the Blurb, other expenses included dues and donations to organizations and activities we support. The Blurb expenses have decreased as fewer hard copy Blurbs are mailed—thanks to all who receive theirs by email!

A walleye stocking fund was initiated; \$4100 in donations received, \$3610 paid to stock fish, and a \$490 balance remains. The Lake Protection Fund started with \$6866 and ended with \$8440; the only expense this year was maintenance along the public access road.

The starting balance of the General Fund includes membership dues paid before the start of the fiscal year; in actuality the membership dues for the year just covered our recurring expenses, but with no cushion. This concern was addressed at the Annual Meeting and a raise in dues from \$30 to \$40 for next year was approved.

The combined balance of the General Fund, including walleye stocking, and the Lake Protection Fund was \$11,950; last year's combined balance was \$10,988.
