Aquatic invasive species- Are we ready?

Aquatic invasive species (AIS) are all around us. So far, we have avoided a major infestation of the worst invasive species. But, despite our best efforts with County inspections and our early detection team, what if one of the bad ones gets into Blackwater Lake? Are we ready?

Aquatic invasive species (AIS) can have a major impact on water quality, fisheries, the whole lake ecosystem, and our use of the lake. The species listed below are already found in Cass County. How could they impact Blackwater Lake if introduced?



Zebra Mussels

Zebra mussels. Zebra mussels are filter feeders. One zebra mussel can filter a quart of water each day, removing tiny food particles. A large population of zebra mussels can reduce the amount of food available for fish larvae and other aquatic life, affecting their populations. They initially can make water clearer potentially resulting in increased plant growth, but in the long term will decrease water clarity as they feed on algae, bacteria, organic matter, and tiny zooplankton that feed on algae, except the nuisance blue-green algae. Zebra mussels clog boat motor intakes, smother native mussels, and their sharp shells are a hazard to swimmers. They spread rapidly and are difficult and very expensive to try to control.

Eurasian watermilfoil. Eurasian watermilfoil is an invasive submergent plant species that starts growing early and shades out other beneficial native plants. It can grow to the water surface creating dense mats and making navigation and recreation difficult. It can easily spread throughout a lake through fragments. It's dense growth impacts fisheries. Loss of native plants affects survival of other species. When the plant dies it contributes nutrients to the lake and can lower oxygen levels. Although herbicides can be effective on Eurasian watermilfoil, eradication is unlikely.

Starry Stonewort

Starry Stonewort. Starry stonewort is the newest AIS of concern for lakes. It is a bright, green macro-algae that grows into bushy dense mats that can grow all the way to the surface. It can clog boat motors and inhibit recreational activities. It produces toxins that make the sediments inhospitable for native plant growth, lessening plant diversity.

Aquatic invasive species (cont'd)

Starry stonewort damages habitat resulting in unsuitable shelter, food, and nesting areas for bass, sunfish, and other species. No effective control method has been found to date.

Curly-leaf pondweed. Curly-leaf pondweed is a submergent plant that grows under the ice and quickly grows to the surface in late spring to early summer. The dense mats of vegetation early in the season shade out beneficial native plants, affecting habitat for other aquatic plant and animal species. It dies off in July, providing a load of nutrients to the water, potentially resulting in an algal bloom.



These are just a few of the AIS. We as a lake association and users of Blackwater Lake need to be ready if we are the next lake with an AIS introduction. Our early detection team will be monitoring the lake looking for AIS, but we need the help of everyone to keep our lake healthy and clean.

What can we do? We can all learn to identify the more common AIS and keep an eye out for them along your shoreline, on dock posts, and as you are out on the lake examine the plants on your anchor. If you suspect a possible AIS, take close-up and other photos, save a sample in water in a plastic bag or container in the refrigerator, and note the location (with gps, marker buoy, or turn on location tags on your phone camera). Contact Carolyn Dindorf, AIS committee chair, (cdindorf@yahoo.com) for help identifying the plant or mussel. If you are interested in joining the AIS monitoring team in the future, contact Carolyn or Lloyd Thielmann.

Consider contributing to the Blackwater Lake Protection Fund. If an AIS introduction occurs, we will work with the DNR and Cass County to identify the extent of the infestation. This monitoring and any treatment or other control is expensive. Let's control it before it becomes a widespread infestation. We have a small fund now, but we need a lot more to be ready to respond quickly.

Tick Safety *by Becky Seemann with thanks to the MN DNR*

As many of you know, Minnesota has native and invasive ticks that can cause diseases. Ticks are active from spring through fall, so prevention measures should be practiced anytime the temperature is above freezing. Wear tight-fitting and tucked-in clothing. Seal pant leg openings with gaiters, socks or rubber boots. Check your clothing and body for ticks after being outdoors and remove them immediately. Use a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body. Shower right away after being outdoors. Dry clothes on high heat for 10 minutes.

- Slowly remove ticks with tweezers or other devices by pinching the tick close to the skin. Pull upward with steady even pressure. Wash bite area with alcohol or soap and water.
- Consider consulting your healthcare provider if you develop symptoms such as fever, chills, aches, pains or rash within a few weeks of a bite.

MN Tick Species

American Dog Tick or Wood Tick-native.

Adult: brown, silvery-white marks in center of tick's back. Transmits Tularemia & Rocky Mountain spotted fever.



Blacklegged Tick or Deer Tick-native.

Adult: orange-red body, black legs. Transmits Lyme disease, anaplasmosis, ehrlichiosis, babesiosis and Powassan virus.



Lone Star Tick-invasive. Adult: single white dot on the tick's back. Transmits Ehrlichiosis, Heartland virus, and tularemia.



packet. These are written, legal instructions regarding your preferences for medical care if you are unable to make decisions for yourself.

It is important to have these instructions in your home, preferably posted on your refrigerator. This is a good idea because emergency responders, such as paramedics, need to find your important healthcare documents quickly. They're trained to look for personal medical information near your fridge. In addition, it is wise to also have a copy of this essential information in your vehicle(s). And if you have pet(s), please include instructions about how and who should care for them. Go online to find a variety of Emergency Information Cards and more detailed information.

The bottom line is that you must have an emergency plan in place.

Membership & Treasurer Report *Linda Burns, Treasurer*

Membership

Our current membership is 131. This is more than the previous year, 117, but not as high as the two preceding years, 138 and 142. See the attached list of paid members.

At the annual meeting in July 2021, membership dues were discussed. Annual dues barely cover a year's normal operating expenses. A raise in dues to \$40 per year was approved and it was noted that members may make additional donations to the Lake Protection Fund, the General Account, and Walleye Stocking. The new dues rate goes into effect this upcoming year, July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023. Please use the attached form to mail dues and donations, or bring your checkbook to the Annual Meeting, July 16!

Treasurer

The General account started July 1, 2021 with \$3,510 and now stands at \$5,232. Note this includes \$790 in donations designated for private walleye stocking every other year in which the DNR does not stock our lake, i.e., 2021, 2023, etc.

The Lake Protection Fund (LPF) started with \$8,440 and now stands at \$11,973, thanks to 67 donations amounting to over \$3,530 designated for the LPF. **Thank you!**
