It's Never Too Late to Love a Loon!

Did you know that Minnesota has more common loons than any other state except Alaska?? Learning about loon behavior can help us enjoy these spectacular birds without causing them distress.


Circle Dance. The circle dance is a low-level territorial interaction during which rival loons slowly swim in circles around each other and evaluate their opponent's fitness. One or more of the loons involved may periodically dive underwater, and in response its rivals will either dip their heads underwater to track its movements or dive after it. This helps them to ensure that they will not be stabbed from below. Circle dances generally do not involve physical contact between rival loons, but they may escalate to physical fights.



Penguin Dance. If a boat, predator, or intruding loon is too close, a loon may perform a distraction display called a "penguin dance"—rearing up in the water with its wings either spread out or clasped against its body and rapidly paddling its feet. Loons performing this display are experiencing extreme stress, in some cases because humans are too close. If you see a loon penguin dancing, please leave the area!



Wing Rowing. When swimming, loons typically rely solely on their feet for propulsion; however, they may use their wings as paddles to help 'row' themselves



Sleeping. Because they are not well built for life on land, loons typically sleep in the water. They take short naps of about 15 minutes. To sleep, a loon turns its neck and folds its head down to rest on its back. During the nesting period, loons may sleep while incubating.

As you all can see in reading local publications, Aquatic Invasive Species/AIS are knocking on our doors. Lakes near us currently have a number of infestations. So let's keep up our great work.
- Looking to Cabin Coffees in 2023, please let us know if you would like to be a host. The 2022 season was great as we were able to meet and share with our neighbors. The dates for 2023 are June 9, July 14 and August 11. Please contact me and we will get you on the schedule. The first to respond get the date slots—so don't hesitate.
- We received our **semiannual stocking of 335 pounds of walleye** from the MN DNR in October. We receive walleye stocking in even-numbered years. Keep in mind that in 2023 if we have funds earmarked for stocking we will try to purchase more. The fund currently has \$2,250 designated. In 2021, we spent around \$3,500 thanks to some very generous donations.
- Our beaver dam problem will be solved by the time you receive this newsletter and the water level will go back down to its Fall level as in years past.
- Regarding the **2023 Tree Seedling Program**, I will be sending out via email the sign-up information sometime this winter. Please keep your eyes open for it and be sure to respond to me or Pat McKee at mckeep@gmail.com


101 Years: The Seemann Family on Blackwater Lake

It was 1921 when Louie Brochhagen told Florenz Seemann about "The Government 40" whereby the government would sell 40 acres of land

for \$1,000.

Back then, no one wanted to buy lakeshore property because you couldn't farm or log it. Grandpa Florenz drove from Gaylord in Western Minnesota to Blackwater Lake. Then, he and Louie pulled a rowboat down the logging road to the lake. The two paddled around the entire lake and finally decided on 40 acres on the south side. The Seemann family paid \$200 and took out a \$800 mortgage. Back then \$1,000 was big money.

For the Seemann family, the 1920s was a time for fishing, playing music and family being together at beautiful Blackwater





Lake Time for the Aaker Family

In their 1951 Mercury, the Aakers drove 5-hours on pot-holed roads to "The Lake." Included are Mom Aaker in her pearl-necklace along with Grandma, 4 kids, a dog and groceries for a week. The car was jam-backed in the days of no phones, computers or televisions at the lake.

It's exciting in1954 when the Aaker family installs their first electric refrigerator. Before that, food was kept in the "ice-box." Neighbor Louie Brochhagen would cut huge blocks of ice from the lake in the winter, bury them in sawdust to be stored in the Ice House through spring, summer and fall.

Life at Pine Haven Resort

Pine Haven Resort opened on Blackwater Lake in 1938, and today still offers a northern Minnesota summer resort vacation experience to the public. Initially owned by Norman DeYoung, the resort recorded many "mom and pop" owners through 2005.



In April 2006, the resort became a Cooperative Association owned by 18 membership shares, each owning one cabin, and still operating as a summer rental resort. All in all, a good vacation time for everyone! www. pinehavenresort.com

Lake Haven Resort Life

The resort was started by Paul Norman's grandfather in late 1940 and cabins were built with logs cut from the property. Dave Norman took over and built 18 cabins with 4 campsites. When Dave died, Paul Norman took over. Next, the Mason family purchased the camp in 1996. After that, Mouw Rental properties purchased

the camp in 1998, and at that time 30 campsites, swimming pool, hot tub and laundry facilities were added. Jump to 2005 when Lake Haven Owner's Association was formed when individual properties were purchased by former guests. Today there are 14 cabins, 30 campsites, 2 homes and 2 vacant lots, which are currently for sale.
